Between May 13 and June 28, in the year 1858, seven Californios were hung by vigilantes at the San Luis Obispo Mission. Another Californio was hunted down and shot by the same vigilante posse. Previously citizens of Mexico, these men were all Americans when their necks were stretched. The official story is that the vigilantes rid the county of murderous bandits, the so-called Powers-Linares Gang. My story is a little different. I focus on three main players: Walter Murray, Pio Linares, and Jack Powers. Was Walter Murray "The Good?" Jack Powers "The Bad?" and Pio Linares "The Ugly?" Let us dig deeper into that tumultuous time when California was taken from Mexico and bring those events into sharper focus. At the end of the First World War more than 192,000 wives had lost their husbands,

and nearly 400,000 children had lost their fathers. Few people remained unscathed. *The Quick and the Dead* pays tribute to the families who were left behind while their husbands, fathers and sons went off to fight, and the generations that followed. Tales of warning, the deepest loves honored by surviving paramours and the indifferent cruelty of life in the 17th-20th century are all recorded in the *Stories From Gravesend Cemetery*. The purpose of this book is to educate the casual cemetery wanderer about how to read the old stones they pass by and to excite the #deathpositivity movement enthusiast or morbidly curious.
