Encountering evidence of postmortem examinations - dissection or autopsy in historic skeletal collections is relatively rare, but recently there has been an increase in the number of reported instances. And much of what has been evaluated has been largely descriptive and historical. The Bioarchaeology of Dissection and Autopsy brings together in a single volume the skeletal evidence of postmortem examination in the United States. Ranging from the early colonial period to the early 1900's, from a coffeehouse at Colonial Williamsburg to a Quaker burial vault in lower Manhattan, the contributions

to this volume demonstrate the interpretive significance of a historically and theoretically contextualized bioarchaeology. The authors employ a wide range of perspectives, demonstrating how bioarchaeological evidence can be used to address a wide range of themes including social identity and marginalization, racialization, the nature of the body and fragmentation, and the emergence of medical practice and authority in the United States. This edited volume draws historians and anthropologists together to explore the contested worlds of epidemic corpses and their disposal. Why are burials so frequently at the center of disagreement, recrimination and protest during epidemics? Why are the human corpses produced in the course of infectious disease outbreaks seen as dangerous, not just to the living, but also to the continued existence of society and civilization? Examining cases from the Black Death to Ebola, contributors challenge the predominant idea that a single, universal framework of contagion can explain the political, social and cultural importance and impact of the epidemic corpse. This book is specifically designed for non-pathologists who normally interact with forensic pathologists. It covers topics within forensic pathology, including the forensic autopsy, postmortem changes and time of death and body identification. My dissertation works within the framework of visual rhetoric and material rhetoric to critique the looking practice of what I term the postmortem gaze. This particular way of viewing the deceased and its representation is both a habitual action and a framework for critical pedagogy that emphasizes embodiment, materiality, and context. The gaze seeks to understand how transgressive postmortem bodies on display can be seen through an amalgamation of the lens of spectacle, education, and commodification, ultimately leading to the transformation of the body into an object. I examine the decedent corporeality of the transgressive based upon age, gender, race, socioeconomic class, nationality, disability, and criminality through such diverse places as the nineteenth century circus sideshow, postmortem photo lockets, and medical school portraiture, to more contemporaneous examples, like the Body Worlds traveling museum of plastinated cadavers and a

traveling mummy exhibition. Using a schema of perception, I analyze how culturally constructed abject bodies are perceived through embodiment, materiality, and context. I situate rhetoric within a mediated physical component and simultaneously intervene in a reductionist view of rhetoric rooted within the linguistic turn that applies textual analysis to images. Through this application of material rhetoric, I use the postmortem gaze to investigate the interstitial space of the corpse as a rich source of rhetorical investigation and knowledge construction. A collection of cutting-edge accounts of special topics from various fields of forensic pathology and death scene investigation. The authors offer critical insight into the medicolegal investigation of bodies found in water, the forensic aspects of the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV)-1 infection of the central nervous system, deaths in a head-down position, and forensic bitemark analysis. The forensic aspects of suicide, murder-suicide, and suicide trends in the United States are also discussed, along with the evaluation of fatal pulmonary thromboembolism and the use of radiology in medicolegal investigations. The precursor of this series is 'Forensic Medicine and Medical Law', a book published by the author in an Asian country in 1995. This book is currently being updated for the global audience. It is expected to be available as a standard textbook by next year. Postmortem Changes and Estimation of Time of Death is the first in a series of booklets covering topics in forensic medicine. As the first in the series, the book starts with the definition and scope of forensic medicine and then goes on to cover in detail subjects, including matters related to somatic death, molecular death and brain death, and points out the dilemmas that the medical community still has to face as a result of for example, the fact that a brain dead body heals its wounds and could deliver its conceptus. Other topics include, immediate, early, late, and late infrequent changes after death, the medico-legal significance of these changes, including their use in estimating the time of

death. References are made to journal articles to provide evidence to some of the recent developments in forensic medicine.
